

This Year (2006) marks the 10th anniversary of Operation One Day of Service, a Southern Region program where each and every lodge in the region is to complete a service project for their community. In our lodge, we have had three chapters complete their projects so far, with a few scheduled for the upcoming weeks. Thanks go out to the Lowaneu Mawat, Oi-Ya-Tah, and Chee-Pa-Tah chapters for completing their projects.

- Lowaneu Mawat Chapter completed their project on October 7th, where they worked with the E.L.C. (Environmental Learning Center) in Wabasso in completing various projects, such as removing Brazilian Pepper Trees, laying mulch, and painting.
- Oi-Ya-Tah Chapter completed their project on October 21st, where they completed service work for Camp Ah-Ba-Lufa in Ft. Pierce, where members cleared trails and picked up trash throughout camp.
- Chee-Pa-Tah Chapter completed their project in mid-October, working with the Cathedral of St. Ignatius members painting signs, parking lines, parking stops, pressure washing the back patio, cut trees, pulled weeds, and much more. Their efforts helped accumulate a combined total of 250+ hours!

Ne-Ki-Wa and Coo-Wa-Chobee chapters both have projects coming up, so those members should check the next Gator Tales for details. There was also an opportunity to go to a general project in Boynton Beach on October 28th, where the Marshall Foundation held its annual Cypress Harvest, where volunteers from the community helped harvest Cypress seeds. Due to rain, we only had 6 members from Chee-Pa-Tah go to it, after working on their chapter project. Now that's dedication! Thanks go out to all those that took the time to make their project happen, and also those that worked it.

For those of you that worked a One Day of Service project AND completed 8 hours of service at a lodge service weekend (June Service, August Ordeal, September Ordeal), you can get the Leadership in Service award. MOAC 2006 has come and gone; if you missed it you really missed quite something.


