2005 Campership Patches

You might be wondering, what the white bordered patches are that look like the weekend activity patches. This year, a limited number of special patches have been made for each weekend. They have a white border and the word "Campership" in place of the activity name. Additionally, a special Campership backpatch was issued to match the theme of the year set. All proceeds from these patches will be used to increase the endowment of the James T. Sasser Campership Fund.

In 1999, the youth of Aal-Pa-Tah Lodge, through the Lodge Executive Committee, made a resolution to create "The Aal-Pa-Tah Campership Fund". The purpose of this fund was to provide support to Scouts with a desire to participate in Summer Camp at Tanah Keeta but without the financial means to do so. Upon creation of the fund, Aal-Pa-Tah Arrowmen set out to raise funds for this endeavor in a variety of ways. Aal-Pa-Tah has sold many patches, including the Normal Rockwell set, the round Campership patches, the Campership Flaps, Campership Neckerchiefs, and a belt buckle, to raise money for this fund. The lodge has also made direct monetary contributions to the fund, as have individuals.

The Aal-Pa-Tah Campership fund has since been renamed the James T. Sasser Campership Fund, and continues to raise money for its purpose. Several Scouts have received support from the fund. In the future, the fund's mission will be expanded to provide support for other activities such as out-of-council camps, high adventure trips, OA events, and national Scouting events. Aal-Pa-Tah is working hard to make this a reality.

To apply for a James T. Sasser Campership, contact the Gulf Stream Council Service Center or the Aal-Pa-Tah Lodge Chief, Adviser, or Campership Chairman. Camperships are open to Scouts registered in the Gulf Stream Council who show financial need and good moral character. If you are interested in supporting the James T. 2005 Jambo Flaps and More

In March the Council Jamboree Committee approached the lodge and asked if the lodge would be interested in having a lodge flap for the National Jamboree that would coordinate with the wildlife theme of the councils' jamboree shoulder patches (JSP's).

The Lodge Executive Committee (LEC) approved a set of two flaps based on the submitted alligator design, one with a gold mylar border to match the gold mylar border of the troops patches and a second with a silver mylar border to match the silver mylar border of the leaders patch. Each person attending the jamboree was given the opportunity to purchase as many of each as they wanted.

Additionally, Section S-4S issued a patch to commemorate each of the OA Summer activities and National Vice Chief Seth Mollitt. It is an eagle wearing a bonnet. Each of the summer's activities is listed on the bonnet. These patches were available to the contingents of each summer activity.

A small quantity of each were ordered for sale to members of the lodge who could not attend the Jamboree. These will be available on a first come, first serve basis at the Ordeal Weekend, September 9-11.

SCOUTING FOR ADVENTURE IN FLORIDA

The sixth edition of "Where to Go Camping" by Aal-Pa-Tah Lodge is now available at the Council Service Center or at the Lodge Box during lodge activities. Every four years the lodge produces a guide to camping in Florida for Boy Scouts. This book is one of the ways the Order of the Arrow helps to promote camping within the Gulf Stream Council.

Each Troop in the council will receive a complimentary copy of the book during the Fall program kickoff. This soft bound edition has a glossy color cover and contains 150 pages. The cover features members of Aal-Pa-Tah Lodge whitewater rafting on the Ocoee River following NOAC 2000 in Tennessee. This book would not have happened without the incredibly dedicated effort of Past Lodge Chief Stephen Brown.

The American Indian Village was another great program at the Jamboree that was presented by the Order. Village staff demonstrated dancing and crafts daily and taught Indian Lore Merit Badge on the Merit Badge Midway. Two powwows were held at the American Indian Village where experts and novices met in the arbor to celebrate American Indian culture through dance and song. The regalia representing all regions of the United States filled the ring to create a sea of color moving to the beat of the drum. Participants and visitors learned a lot as they traveled through the village, viewing displays and listening to guest speakers and demonstrators.

Forming a Lodge of Arrowmen divided into youth run chapters, the Order of the Arrow Service Corps (OASC) served the Jamboree in a very dynamic capacity. Each chapter, daily, was assigned tasks that were delegated to the members by the elected chapter chiefs. Service Corps members filled holes in the Jamboree staff to ensure that the machine stayed well oiled and the program ran smoothly. Service Corps members did everything from assist in printing the Jamboree Today newspaper to helping to serve more than 1,000,000 fresh lunches to Jamboree participants. When 40-60 thousand people flooded the Jamboree Arena for the closing show (There was no opening show, due to heat and thunderstorms), OASC members served as crowd control, facilitating the seating and dismissal of participants and guests. Every day brought a new task and new challenges for these Arrowmen.

The presence of the OA at the National Scout Jamboree made a positive impact on each participant, thus serving its purpose as Scouting's National Honor Society well! The ideal of youth leadership in the Order was exemplified by the fact that each OA Program at the Jamboree was led by an elected youth Jamboree Vice Chief.






