



You may recall from my last column that I expressed the great need for the ties of Brotherhood in our Order. Indeed, Brotherhood is the one of the three ingredients that combine to form the glue which binds us, but we must not forget the other two ingredients. Just as the bond of Brotherhood is represented by the material symbol of rope, Cheerfulness is represented by the flame. The flame is warm and comforting but requires constant attention, just as our sense of cheerfulness is warm and comforting to others but must be constantly maintained.

This past weekend (from when I wrote this), I participated in a twenty-three mile canoe trip on the Peace River with my troop. Had we kept our cheerful spirit strong, we would have enjoyed ourselves and a true Scouting Adventure would not had faced to possibility of being ruined in our minds.

This short anecdote serves as an example of how a cheerful spirit can be beneficial to all involved in scouting. It is so important that among the twelve points of the Scout Law, you can find "A Scout is Cheerful."

This year will be the first year in about a decade that the Aal-Pa-Tah Lodge will produce a camping book. The book is a service to the Coucil, but this year we have decided to go a little bit beyond! The Complete Camping Book will go out to scoutmas-

ters and tentatively Cubmasters, as a resource for camping in Florida. Extras will probably be sold with the money going either for camperships or the cost of production for next year's book. The book encompasses camping policies, camp grounds, hiking, biking, canoeing, and other day

trips, favorite recipes, chapel services, forms and rules, annual festivals and events, camping lists, maps and charts. The range will be the Florida Peninsula going as far north as Ocala and possibly St. Augustine. An electronic version might also be

available, and the web page should be updated with the information. Hopefully the book will become an invaluable resource that is improved yearly or at least every other year. At that point the range of the book could be extended to cover more of Florida,

and maybe into Georgia and Alabama. Many future goals can now be explored with the existence of an actual book. Right now the book looks like it will be all black and white with a glossy, light cardboard cover. It will be heat bound and the present number of production is 500. Origi-


Order of the Arrow



Clarification of Unit Elections
Camping
Requirement

In response to concerns about the possible misinterpretation of the current camping requirement for OA membership, the National Order of the Arrow Committee approved a clarification to the existing camping requirement at their December 27, 1998 meeting. The clarification is as follows (changes are shown in **bold**):

After registration with a troop or team, have experienced fifteen days and nights of Boy Scout camping during the two-year period prior to the election. The fifteen days and nights must include one, but no more than one, long-term camp consisting of six consecutive days and five nights of resident camping, approved and under the auspices and standards of the Boy Scouts of America. The balance of the camping must be overnight, weekend, or other short-term camps.



AAL-PA-TAH LODGE OFFICER ELECTIONS

General Statement

Each year the Lodge gathers for the Annual Business Meeting for the purpose of electing the youth leaders who will carry out the Lodge program for the ensuing year. At the Service Weekend elections of the following officer positions will be held:

Lodge Chief Lodge Vice Chief Lodge Secretary Chapter Chief Chapter Vice Chief Chapter Secretary

Treasurer Historian

Candidate Eligibility

A Candidate for office:

- Must have been inducted into Aal-Pa-Tah Lodge or have transferred into the Lodge at least 6 months prior to the date of the elections.
- 2. Must be a 1999 dues paid member of the Lodge.
- 3. Shall not reach his nineteenth (19) birthday during the term in which he will serve in the office (term ends:05/20/2000).
- 4. Must physically reside (live and attend school or be employed) within the official boundaries of the Gulf Stream Council, B.S.A.
- 5. Must be currently registered in a unit that is chartered by the Gulf Stream Council, B.S.A.
- 6. Present himself as a candidate at the scheduled Candidate's Meeting on May 14, 1999 at Roger Dean Stadium at the Mega Scout Show in <u>full Class A uniform</u>, at 8:00 p.m or if a candidate is unable to attend the meeting on May 14, 1999, he must call Patrick Kerley (Lodge Chief) 747-8296 or Fred Danaher (Advisor) 276-3044 on or before May 12, 1999.* The failure to attend

the candidate meeting or in the alternative, to timely contact the Lodge Chief or Lodge Advisor will bar an arrowman from running for office.

*Chapter Officers do not need attend this meeting or contact the Lodge Chief or Advisor in advance. Chapter elections must be held at the same Lodge weekend and at a time and location arranged with the Lodge Chief.

NOTE: The Interview Committee is composed of the current Lodge Chief (if not running for re-election), the Lodge Advisor, Associate Advisors and one other appointed member. If a Candidate desires he may have one person with him during the interview; this person is the choice of the candidate and can be a parent, Scoutmaster or simply a friend so long as the individual is not also a candidate.

Voter Eligibility

All members of the Lodge whose current dues are paid and have not reached their 21st birthday are entitled to vote. No absentee ballots and no voting proxies are allowed. The Lodge Secretary will provide the Supervisor of Elections with the official list of eligible voters.

General Election Rules

- 1. A Candidate may run for only one office. He declares his candidacy at the Candidate's Meeting on May 14th (see previous section). If defeated for the declared office he may not be nominated for another office unless there are no declared candidates for that office.
- There are no nominations from the floor unless there are no declared Candidates.

- 3. Campaign promotional material is limited to a single flyer. The size may not exceed 8 1/2" by 11." It may be printed on both sides, folded or cut in any manner and on any paper stock. There will be no other campaign material for the candidate nor in his behalf.
- 4. A Candidate may be disqualified for violations of the election procedure or for conduct which is not in keeping with the highest traditions of the Boy Scouts or America. The Scout Oath and Laws and the Order of the Arrow Obligation will serve as the standard of judgment. A Candidate may be held responsible for the actions of other members acting in his behalf.
- 5. The Lodge Chief and Lodge Advisor shall appoint one youth and one Advisor to conduct the election. The youth shall be called the Supervisor of Elections and shall have all such duties and responsibilities as are implied by that title and any other duties as may be assigned to him by the Lodge Chief.
- 6. At the time of the Annual Lodge Business Meeting (May Weekend) a Candidate will be expected to:
 - A. Be nominated by another youth member of the Lodge. The nominator will be allowed to speak for 2 minutes on behalf of the Candidate. (The current Lodge Chief may not nominate nor publicly endorse any Candidate for office).
 - B. Following nomination, a candidate must speak on his own behalf for 2 minutes.
- 7. All officers are elected by a majority vote of the votes cast. Ballots that are not intelligible will not be included in the number determining the required majority.
- 8. Candidates may not be elected by acclamation. A candidate running without opposition must still receive a majority.
- 9. In the event of a tie vote there will be one additional ballot to break the tie. Before that ballot is taken the two candidates will be given an additional 2 minutes to address the membership. If

- the second ballot results in a tie, the Lodge Executive Committee shall determine by majority vote who will serve in unfilled officer position.
- 10. The marked ballots after counting will be held by the Supervisor of Elections for a period of 30 days. The ballots with the permission of the Lodge Chief may be reviewed by any Lodge member during that period.



FROM THE NORTH:


Via I-95 Southbound: Take Exit 58 East (Donald Ross Road). Proceed East along Donald Ross Road to Central Blvd. (Approx. 3/4 mile). Turn left on Central Blvd. The Stadium will be on your right.

Via Florida's Turnpike Southbound: Exit at Indiantown Road (Exit 116) and enter interstate 95 South. From Interstate 95 exit at Donald Ross Road (Exit 58) and travel East 1 mile to Central Blvd. At the light make a left and follow Central to the circle. From the circle take Main Street to Roger Dean Stadium. FROM THE SOUTH:

Via I-95 Northbound: Take Exit 58 East (Donald Ross Road). Proceed East along Donald Ross Road to Central Blvd. (Approx. 3/4 mile). Turn left on Central Blvd. The Stadium will be on your right.

Via Florida's Turnpike Northbound: Take PGA Blvd. exit East. Proceed East along PGA Blvd. to Central Blvd. (Approx. 1/2

mile). Turn left and proceed North on Central Blvd. The Stadium will be on your right (Approx 3 miles).





Highlights from the 1998 Mega Scout Show Pig Roast



THE HISTORY OF SCOUTING: THE 1920'S

1920

The First National Training Conference for Scout Executives was held in September at Bear Mountain, Palisades Interstate Park. The First World Jamboree was held in England; Boy Scouts from 32 of 52 countries were present; the Boy Scouts of America sent 301 members. The First International Conference of Scout Leaders was held in connection with the jamboree, with International Scout Commissioner Mortimer L. Schiff and others representing the Boy Scouts of America. The quota plan was adopted. The Scout

International Bureau was established in London. Member-December 31, was 478,528. Total members to date, 1,643,988.

1921

Scouts of Washington, D.C., served as aides and guides at the limitation of arms conference. Scouts participated at the annual Eastern States Exposition at Springfield, Mass. Outstanding civic Good Turns were rendered in forest conservation and in connection with the Knickerbocker Theater disaster

at Washington, and floods at Pueblo, Colo., and San Antonio, Texas. Membership, December 31, was 513,015. Total members to date, 1,879,471.

1922

The Order of the Arrow became an official program experiment. The Second International Conference of Scout Leaders was appointed as a permanent international committee upon which the Boy Scouts of America was represented by Mortimer L. Schiff and Frank Presbrey. The Second National Training Conference for Scout Executives

took place at Blue Ridge, N.C. The membership roundup was stimulated by streamer awards by President Warren G. Harding. Membership, December 31, 534,415. Total members to date, 2,110,973.

1923

international left handclasp adopted. Patrol leader conferences and training courses for Scout leaders were developed. The Laura Spelman Rockefeller Memorial Fund advanced \$100,000 for the promotion of Boys' Life. The Bureau of Church Relations was established at the national office.

> Patriotic pilgrimages to the homes of great Americans and to historic spots were made. Membership, December 31, was 587,578. Total members to date, 2,371,520.

1924

The Every Scout a Swimmer program was inaugurated. The first achievement badges were earned by physically handicapped Scouts. The Third International Conference of Scout Leaders was attended by 6,000 boys from 33 Scout associations. The Lone Scouts of America merged with the

Boy Scouts of America. The Second World Jamboree was held at Copenhagen, Denmark; our delegation numbered 56. The Third Biennial Conference of Scout Executives was held at Estes Park, Colo. The International Scout constitution and bylaws were adopted. Membership, December 696,620. Total members to date, 3,144,300.

1925

James J. Storrow of Boston was elected president. The first National Training School for executives opened. Outstanding service was rendered by Scouts in the Illinois tornado, California earthquake, and Louisiana fire. A delegation from Boy Scouts of America visited South America to advance Scouting there. Membership, December 31, 756,857. Total members to date, 3,436,294.

1926

President James J. Storrow died in March and Vice-President Milton A. McRae was elected to fill his term. At the annual meeting in May, Walter W. Head was elected president. Sir Robert S.S. Baden-Powell, founder of Scouting, attended the annual meeting and traveled throughout the country inspecting Scouting centers. The first Silver Buffalo Awards for distinguished service to boyhood were presented. Twenty-two awards were given: the first to Baden-Powell and the second to the Unknown Scout whose Good Turn brought Scouting to America. The Fourth International Scout Conference was held at Kandersteg, Switzerland. The Fourth Biennial Conference of Scout Executives was held at Hot Springs, Ark. The national Executive Board authorized development of a program for younger boys. Exceptional Scout service was rendered in the Florida hurricane and Arkansas flood. Membership, December 31, was 783,574. Total members to date, 3,749,244.

1927

Eagle Palms were added to the list of awards. Twelve new rural merit badges were added, bringing the total to 89. Eight Sea Scouts were taken on the Borden-Field Museum Expedition to the Bering Sea. Exceptional service was rendered by Scouts in the Mississippi and Vermont flood disasters and the St. Louis tornado. The national office was moved to its new enlarged quarters at 2 Park Avenue, New York, N.Y. Membership, December 31, was 785,633. Total members to date, 4,095,988.

1928

Three Scouts-David R. Martin, Douglas Oliver, and Dick Douglas-accompanied the Martin Johnson Expedition to Africa. The Fifth National Training Conference for Scout Executives was held at Cornell University. The 18th annual meeting was held in San Francisco. Four Scouts participated in the

Lincoln Highway covered-wagon tour from coast to coast and Paul A. Siple, a Sea Scout, accompanied Commander Richard E. Byrd to the Antarctic. Membership, December 31, was 819,791. Total members to date, 4,499,908.

1929

The Third World Jamboree, held at Birkenhead, England, where 1,300 Scouts and Scouters represented the Boy Scouts of America, was attended by 50,000 Scouts representing 73 different lands. It was followed by the Fifth International Scout Conference. The Cub Scout program was put into operation on an experimental basis. Registration of all Scouters was authorized. Membership, December 31, was 833,897. Total members to date, 4,779,219.

The Boy Scout Handbook in the 1920's

1927 Third edition 4,000,000 copies

From 1927 to 1940, the cover told a story of youth facing in the same direction as Benjamin Franklin, George Washington, Abraham Lincoln. Theodore Roosevelt. and Charles Lindbergh. The boys who used this book found in it purpose and direction to meet the depression and grow with confidence.






